# BIOACTIVITY OF MARINE ORGANISMS PART V : SCREENING OF SOME MARINE FAUNA FROM THE INDIAN COAST

## ABSTRACT

Of twenty nine alcoholic extracts of marine organisms screened for a wide range of biological activities, 14 showed promising results. Of these, two were CNS stimulant, 3 hypoglyceamic, 2 anti-implantation, 2 antimicrobial, 2 antiviral, 1 spasmolytic, 1 hypotensive, 1 CNS depressant and six toxic. Six of these extracts showed multiple activities.

A programme is in operation at the National Institute of Oeeanography, Goa, in collaboration with the Central Drug Research Institute, Lucknow for the screening of extracts of marine organisms for a wide range of biological activities. The programme consists of collection, identification and extraction of marine flora and fauna found along the coastline (including islands) for biological screening. The results of biological screening of some marine organisms have been reported in earlier papers of the series (Naqvi, Solimabi, Kamat, Fernandes, Reddy, Bhakuni and Dhawan, 1981; Kamat, Solimabi, Naqvi, Fernandes, Reddy, Bhakuni and Dhawan, 1981; Kamat, Solimabi, Naqvi, Fernandes, Reddy, Bhakuni and Srimal, 1990; Naik, Kamat, Parameshwaran, Das, Bhattacharya, Ramani, Bhakuni and Srimal, 1989). The present communication deals with biological activity data of 29 extracts of marine animals. The biological screening includes tests for antibacterial, antifungal, antifertility, antiviral, hypoglyceamic and a wide range of pharmacological activities.

The marine animals for the study have been collected from the coasts of Goa, Maharashtra, Tamil Nadu, Gujarat, Lakshadweep and Andaman islands during premonsoon and postmonsoon periods. Fresh animal material was rinsed in water to free it from extraneous matter, cut into small pieces and immersed in 90% alcohol at ambient temperature. After two days the alcohol was decanted. The process was repeated three times. The solvent from the combined percolate was removed under reduced pressure and below 40°C. The alcoholic extract was finally dried in a vacuum desiccator. All the extracts of the marine animals were tested for antibacterial, antifun-gal, antiviral and a wide range of pharmacological activities. The details of these

biological tests have been described elsewhere (Dhar, Dhar, Dhawan, Mehrotra and Ray, 1968; Bhakuni, Dhar, Dhar, Dhawan and Mehrotra, 1969, 1977).

Extracts of marine organisms showing biological activity are summarised in Table I.

Of the 29 extracts of marine animals tested, activity was observed in 14 extracts. Of the active extracts, 2 showed CNS stimulant, 4 hypoglyceamic, 2 antifertility (antiimplantation), 2 antimicrobial, 1 spasmolytic, 1 hypotensive, 1 CNS depressant, besides these, six extracts were toxic. None of these, however, had antibacterial, antifungal, spasmogenic or diuretic activities.

The extract of holothurian spp. Actinopyga mauritiana exhibited hypotensive and antimicrobial activities, whereas Thelenata ananas showed toxicity in addition to antimicrobial activity. A saponin "Echinoside B" isolated from A. mauritiana was toxic to fishes (Parameshwaran, Naik, Das and Kamat, 1990). Three of the Holothuria sp. viz., Holothuria echinitis, Holothuria impotius and Thelenata ananas exhibited high toxicity. The extracts of Afrocucumis africana was found to possess antiviral and antiimplantation activity.

Among five extracts of Mollusca, Nerita sp. exhibited CNS stimulant, Octopus vulgaris spasmolytic, whereas Onchidium verruculatum showed hypoglyceamic activity.

The ability of octopi to paralyze prey, before ingestion, with secretions of posterior salivary glands has long been known. The active agents present in the salivary glands of the octopus have been found to be a mixture of low molecular weight amines, peptides and proteinaceous materials (Hartman, Clark, Cyr, Jordon and Leibhold, 1960). Ghiretti (1960) isolated an active proteinaceous fraction from the salivary glands of *Octopus vulgaris* and *O. macropus*. While these authors found that the toxins from octopi have paralytic and hypotensive action, the present investigations indicated only spasmolytic action for the crude extract of *O. vulgaris*.

Among 11 coelenterates, extracts of 5 organisms exhibited biological activities. Extracts of *Alcyonium* sp., *Cassiopeia* sp. and *Epizoanthus* sp. showed antiviral activity whereas *Lexosuberites* sp. possessed antimicrobial activity in addition to antiviral. Extract of *Echinomurica* sp. from Grande island, Goa, exhibited antifertility activity. Several heterocyclic azulene derivatives have been isolated from *Epizoanthus arenaceus*, but no biological activity of these compounds has been reported so far.

Of five extracts of Arthropoda, only *Leptodius* sp. collected from Malvan has shown toxic and CNS stimulant activity.
