ZOOPLANKTON & FISHERIES

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Zooplankton is a group of heterotrophic plankton and form a dominant constituent of animal organisms in the By virtue of their abundance and intermediary role between phytoplankton and fish, they are considered as the chief index of utilization of aquatic biotope at the secondary trophic level. The zooplankton inhabit the oceans at almost depths and occupy practically every type of ecological Being more complicated in species composition niche. phytoplankton, zooplankton include a great majority of of invertebrate from the lowest Protozoa to The representatives of almost each Urochorda (Tunicata). taxon occur in holoplankton. Inspite of their abundance and zooplanktonic organisms exhibit diversity. the distribution both along the horizontal and vertical planes. The zooplankton patchiness or spatial heterogeneity along the important character becomes an plane distribution of some taxa during certain period of the year. The patchiness extends on scales of several metres to hundred The intensity of zooplankton thousands of kilometres. aggregation will depend on their ability to counter dispersion, phytoplankton growth, grazing rates, predator/ prey relationship and reproduction strategies of zooplankton. zooplankton patchiness is utalized by higher trophic The

levels, particularly by pelagic fish species and larvae.

Zooplankton being passive drifters, they are used indicators of water masses and their distribution. circulation, productivity, coastal upwelling etc. The occurrence of upwelling along the Indian coast and influechce biological productivity has on been documented (Ramamirthm and Jayaraman, 1960; Sankaranaryanan et al. 1978; Sharma, 1978; Banse, 1968 & 1984 and Shetye et al. 1985). In the upwelling areas, the zooplankton standing stock (biomass) is higher and zooplankton community is usually dominated by herbivores. Barber and Smith (1981) described how the regularity of upwelling process has allowed organisms to evolve life history, feeding and behavioral adaptations to exploit the optimum conditions. Species of copepods of family Calanidae are perhaps the best studied of the zooplankton that have evolved mechanisms allowing them to dominate communities during upwelling events.

Zooplankton constitute the main food items of several economic important animals. During the feeding seasons, the pelagic fishes migrate in shoals to the feeding ground rich in food, such as various groups of crustacea (copepods, cladocerans etc.), which can, therefore, be used as indicators for finding migratory routes and fishing grounds. The fish catch, particularly pelagic, occur in areas of high plankton production. The zooplankton in addition to

indicators of rich potential fishing grounds are increasing being used as biological indicators for digestive enzymes, lipids and genetic markers.
