CHROMOSOMAL ABERRATIONS FOUND IN PARACALANUS ACULEATUS (GIESBRECHT) AT THE TIME OF SOLAR ECLIPSE

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ABSTRACT

Chromosomal aberrations in the form of an unequal heteromorphic homologous pair and a supernumerary chromosome were observed in the gonad of a copepod—*Paracalanus aculeatus* after being exposed to the total solar eclipse of Feb. 16, 1980. The behaviour of these chromosomes during the course of mitosis and meiosis are presented here.

Key words: Chomosomal aberration, solar eclipse, copepod, Paracalanus.

Karyotype is generally recognised as a constant species character. Sometimes, however, departures from the main pattern may take place due to some abnormal environmental conditions (Swanson, 1965). These morphological and numerical changes are called in a broad sense chromosomal aberrations (Rieger, Michaelis and Green, 1968).

On 16th February, 1980, in Goa, the total solar eclipse started at 1417 hrs-IST, reached its peak at 1540 hrs and ended at 1652 hrs. On such an occasion when the natural environmental conditions were known to undergo a change, it was planned to conduct field experiments to observe the chromosomal changes in wild populations of some predominant species of estuarine copepods. Amongst the five species studied only *Paracalanus aculeatus* showed chromosomal aberrations which are reported here.

Specimens of *Paracalanus aculeatus* Giesbrecht were sorted out from zooplankton collections from the mouth of the Zuari estuary. Goa, made on 15th, 16th and 17th February 1980 so as to cover the periods both before and after the total solar, eclipse. The details of methodology and analysis are same as described elsewhere (Goswami and Goswami, 1973, 1974 and 1979).

Twentyfive percent of the specimens studied on 16th and 17th February, showed chromosomal mosaicism and possessed cells with the normal and abnormal karyotypes in the same gonad. Whereas the cells of specimens collected on 15th February showed the normal karyotype.

The normal karyotype of both the exposed and the unexposed animals showed a diploid number of 12 and haploid number of 6 chromosomes during the gonial and meiotic metaphases (Figs. 1-5). The karyotype formula was $6M \pm 4SM \pm 2A$ in the chromosomes of the size range of $0.6\mu - 3.0\mu$ (Table 1).

In the abnormal karyotype, the largest homologous pair had changed into an unequal pair with chromosomes of 2.5μ and 5.5μ in size. The smaller homologue was metacentric and the larger one submetacentric in nature.

In addition to this a heterochromatic supernumerary chromosome of 0.6µ size was noticed. The percentage of cells at mitosis and meiosis on different dates, showing the presence of heteromorphic pair and the supernumerary chromosome is given in Table II.

The general course of mitosis and meiosis in the chromosomes of both normal and abnormal karvotypes of the exposed and unexposed animals was found to be regular. However, in the former case, general effects of exposure to radiations on stickiness of chromosomes and anaphase-telophase bridges were seen (Figs. 7-9, 11 and 12).

Spontaneous chromosemal aberrations originate from some sert of chromosemal rearrangements induced by the naturally occurring radiations (Swanson, 1965). Herskowitz (1965) described that the rate of occurrence of induced chromosomal changes is rather high in case of exposure to ultraviolet and other electromagnetic rays of higher energy. These high energy rays are prominantly present during the total solar eclipse.

In the present study, the chromesemal aberrations suggest that P. aculeatus has been affected. It is difficult to ascribe the possible pathway of chromosomal changes, but, the total absence of aberrant cells in the unexposed animals collected a day and a year earlier, and presence of mosaicism in the exposed animals suggest that the changes might have occurred during the present total solar celipse. The possible target seems to be some gonial cells.

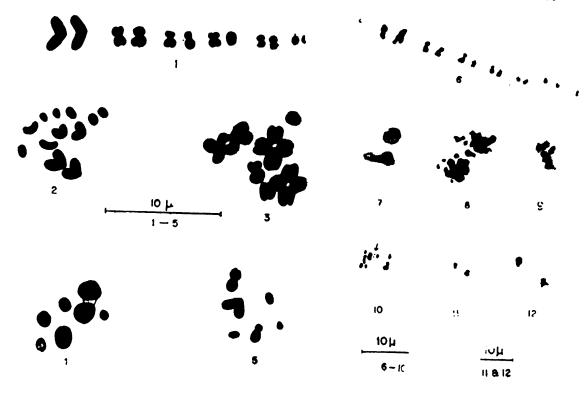

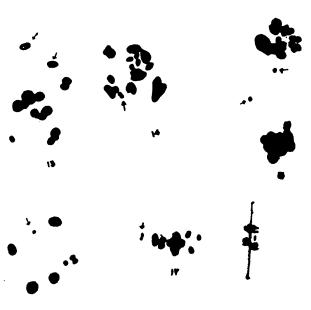
